

The Mercy Rule

Background

Rules of the Game of Snooker are approved for use by the World Professional Billiards & Snooker Association (WPBSA) and the International Billiards & Snooker Federation (IBSF) and are subject to periodic review by those organisations.

A review in 2003 saw the following amendment made to **Section 3 – Rule 4 – END OF FRAME:**

"ADD 4(d)

At the completion of any *break* and when only the colours remain on the table, if four (4) or more snookers are required, the referee will 'award' the *frame* 'against' the player requiring the snookers.

This rule does not apply if the *frame* scores are equal on the final *frame*.

In 2008 at a subsequent review this addition [i.e. Rule 3.4(d)] was <u>removed</u> from the *Rules* of the Game of Snooker. Whilst it was in effect and part of the official rules, 3.4(d) was commonly known as "The Mercy Rule".

Local Interpretation

Although Rule 3.4(d) has been removed from the official *Rules of the Game of Snooker* since 2008, it has continued to remain popular at various Club and Regional Association competitions throughout Australia. At this level, it has been utilised as a means of preventing frames going on for extended periods of time while a player attempts to rectify a virtually impossible points deficit by pursuing repeated snookers once on the coloured balls.

The SBCC Board has therefore adopted the continued use of "The Mercy Rule" in all SBCC Regional scratch (i.e. non-handicap) snooker events as a means of ensuring that games in all grades are completed within a reasonable time expectation. This applies equally to preliminary rounds as well as all competition play-offs/finals series.

The points difference required for the frame to be 'awarded' with each of the colours left on the table is as follows:

Ball	Difference	Colour
	40	Yellow
	38	Green
	35	Brown
•	34	Blue
T _n	32	Pink

NOTE: (1) "The Mercy Rule" does not apply if the frame scores are equal on the <u>final</u> frame.

Therefore, if the frame scores are 1-1 in a best of three frame game or 2-2 in a best of five frame game, the last scheduled frame must be played out to the end regardless of the difference in scores.

NOTE: (2) The frame is awarded at the <u>end</u> of the break – e.g. if potting the yellow puts a player 38 in front, but he/she then fouls on the green, the frame is not awarded as the points difference would only be 34.

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
